### **Christianity- Christingle**

As part of the Social Skills curriculum, the pupils have been creating Christingles and thinking about the symbolism of each element for Christian's during this festive season

- A Christingle is made from: An orange to represent the world
- Red ribbon to represent God's love for the world and the blood of Jesus Christ
- Sticks of dried fruits or sweets to represent God's creations and the four seasons and;
- A lit candle to represent Jesus being the light of the world, bringing hope.

Christingles are usually used during church services and school assemblies during Advent. They are lit during the service and all the lights are turned off. Prayers for people in need are said and songs are sung.

### Hinduism- Diwali

The pupils have explored the Hindu celebration of Diwali.

They learnt about some of the

activities that Hindus do to celebrate the festival of light including cleaning the house, visiting their temple, having a special meal and letting





off fire works. The children enjoyed using colorful rice to create Rangoli patterns and painted their own Mehndi patterns.

# Religious Education & Culture

This term across school the pupils have been immersed in learning about key festivals and celebrations in a range of faiths.

### Judahism- Hanukkah

This half term the pupils have been learning all about the Jewish festival of Hanukkah. Hanukkah is the Jewish festival of light, and this year was celebrated between Thursday 7th December and Friday 15th December.





During Hanukkah, each night an additional candle on the menorah is lit.

Each day of Hanukkah is filled with songs, games, food and gifts.

## Islam Workshop

As part of our drive to provide our pupils with a broad and balanced Religious Education curriculum, this half term we welcomed the first of a series of RE workshops that will be delivered across the academic year.

Imran Kotwal, visited school to run workshops focusing on the religion of Islam. He brought a range of artefacts to share with the children and discussed how the artefacts are important to the Islamic faith.

To educate the children about the multicultural society that we live in and to develop the British Value of tolerance, we are looking forward to the other workshops that are taking place throughout the academic year. These will focus on the key religions of Christianity, Judaism, Sikhism and Hinduism.







# **Educational Visits & Enrichment**

This half term, there has been a range of exciting enrichment opportunities to bring learning to life and to make lasting childhood memories for our pupils,

### Year 2 - Thackrey Museum

To kick off their history topic, 'Nurturing Nurses', the pupils in Year 2 visited the Thackery Museum. Whilst there, the pupils stepped back in time exploring the museum exhibits to see how hygiene conditions and medicine has developed over time. The pupils took part in a workshop led by Florence Nightingale where they discovered all about Florence's life. The children became Doctors and Nurses at Scutari hospital. Before learning about how Florence cared for her patients and changed the conditions in hospitals.





### Year 1 – History of Toys Workshop

This half term, Year 1 had an exciting morning exploring toys from the past. The children played with a range of toys which they hadn't previously experienced. The children learnt how to identify if a toy was from the past by looking at the type of material it is made from and if it has a mechanism. Finally, the children were able to place the toys on a timeline and designed their very own rocking horse toy.

## Year 6 - Robinwood at Dobroyd Castle

This half term, our Year 6 children went on their residential visit to Robinwood. Our children not only got to experience something new and exciting but also, stepped outside of their comfort zone and challenged themselves to conquer their fears and embraced every opportunity. From rock-climbing to zip-lining the children had to apply themselves and work together as a team. Here is what some of our pupils had to say about their experience:

# **Reading & Enrichment**

At Oyster Park, we believe reading is a key life skill and one to be enjoyed! Reading is at the heart of learning at Oyster Park and is a vital skill that supports our children's learning across the whole curriculum.

### John Dougherty Author, Poet & Songwriter

On Tuesday 12th December, our school was visited by renowned author, poet and songwriter John Dougherty. John's the award-winning author of lots of amazing books such as 'The Hare shaped hole' and 'There's a pig up my nose.' John conducted a series of poetry workshops with children from Reception to Year 6, sharing his love of the craft and helping to nurture our reading for pleasure culture. The children also had the opportunity to purchase their own copy of one of his signed books.

### **Reading at home**

At Oyster Park we are driven to inspire a pleasure for reading within all our children. One of the great ways to achieve this is to read with family members

at home. Reading can be done anywhere; whether it be listening whilst travelling in the car, during mealtimes, whilst relaxing on the sofa or even at before bed-time.



All reading done at home can be recorded in the pupils reading records to allow teachers to see how much the children have been reading outside of school. As a school we recommend every child reads at home at least 4 times a week.

### **Christmas Reads**

As part of the Christmas Festivities, we invited parents to come into school and enjoy a Christmas read with their children. The morning began with both parents and pupils listening to a Christmas story, read by the class teacher. The parents and pupils then helped themselves to a hot chocolate and a mince pie before taking part in a range of festive text inspired activities. Pupils and parents got the opportunity to make festive crafts such as reindeer baubles, Christmas cards and read some lovely Christmas stories together.

In the new year we will begin new topics and new units of work. Below you will find a snapshot of the learning that will take place across the term in your child's year group. You will be able to find copies of the subject Knowledge Organisers and the Curriculum Newsletters on our school website to help you to support your child with their learning at home.

### Nursery

Next term the children in Nursery will be exploring 'Minibeasts' and 'Farms'. The children will be learning about different minibeasts, their chosen habitats and how to care for living things. We will be discussing life cycles and the changes that can happen to insects and bugs. After the children have explored Minibeasts we will begin to look at farms and the daily life of a farmer. The curriculum will be enriched by some exciting visitors to school from 'lan's Mobile Farm'. This will provide the children with an opportunity to see a range of farm animals in person and listen to professionals explain how to care for the animals on a farm. The children will also have a chance to interact with these animals if they want to. In Mathematics, the children will continue to explore numbers to 5 and develop their Mathematical language. We will be developing the children's listening and attention skills through daily rhyming, story time and phonics sessions. The children will continue to be developing their pencil control so they can hold a pencil using a tripod grip, while others will be developing good pencil control.

#### **Upper Foundation**

Within the Understanding the World aspect of the Curriculum in the Spring term the children will develop their skills as geographers to identify the human and physical features of the local area and Castleford and will make comparisons with the features of Antarctica. As historians, the children will explore the lives of famous explorers from the past including Robert Falcon Scott and Neil Armstrong and will develop their understanding of the role of paleontologists in helping us to learn about dinosaurs from the past. Within the creative curriculum, the children will be practicing their threading and weaving skills before learning how to sew to create a bookmark using a basic running stitch. As artists, they will explore using different tools to apply paint before creating their own collages to show simple landscapes. The children will learn about space and the solar system within science before investigating the features that sea creatures have that allow them to live in the sea. In RE, the children will talk about places that are special to them before learning about places of worship in different religions.

#### Year 1

Year 1's topic for the Spring term is 'Up, Up and Away'. As historians, the children will learn about the history and pioneers of aviation and will visit the Elvington Air Museum to bring the topic to life. As geographers, the children will continue to develop their understanding of what it is like to live in the United Kingdom exploring the four countries and identifying key features of a map. As scientists, the children will learn the names of various materials and study the importance of their properties. As theologists, the children will immerse themselves in Bible stories and learn what it means to be a Christian for those that follow the Christian faith. As artists, the children will explore the colour wheel and as designers will make their own moving picture books and puppets.

#### Year 2

In Year 2 this spring as computer programmers the pupils will be looking at creating algorithms using the app Scratch Jnr. The pupils will learn the skill of debugging and be able to identify 'bugs' within a sequence they program. As scientists, the pupils will explore the uses of everyday materials. They will identify and compare the suitability of materials including wood, metal, plastic, glass, brick, rock, paper and cardboard for particular uses. Across the term they will also study plants. Pupils will observe and describe how seeds and bulbs grow into mature plants and investigate the needs of plants. As historians, pupils will explore how the Great Fire of London began and how it spread across the city. Following this, the pupils will investigate how we have come to know about the Great Fire looking at a range of sources from the past such as Samuel Pepys's diary. They will then explore how the Great Fire ended and the impact that this had on London and the people who lived there.

As theologists, pupils will be focusing on the theme of celebrations. They will begin by looking at which foods are eaten at key religious celebrations and explore how people dress. Pupils will learn about the importance of Easter to followers of the Christian faith and will listen and discuss the Easter story. Pupils will also learn about Passover and Eid. As artists, the pupils will explore the life and works of Romare Bearden. They will experiment with secondary colours and will create different textures inspired by nature using a range of media.

#### Year 3

In Spring, as writers Year 3 will be focusing on the texts 'The Rhythm of the Rain' by Graham Baker Smith and 'Jemmy Button' by Alix Barzeley. The children will be inspired to write in a range of styles and produce a setting description and a return narrative, building on their knowledge and skills from the Autumn term. As mathematicians, the children will be looking at multiplying and dividing up to 8. They will be using the inverse method as a strategy to check their answers as well as been exposed to reasoning and problem-solving questions. As scientists, the children will explore the unit of plants where they will develop their knowledge of their requirements to be able to live and grow and how they vary from plant to plant. As historians, the children will continue to study changes in Britain from the Stone Age to the Iron Age. They will compare and contrast the Bronze Age and the Iron Age and compare the changes and continuity between these periods. As geographers, the children will develop their maps interpreting skills. The children will understand how to find locations on a map by using a key and 4 figure grid references and 8 points on a compass. As theologists, the pupils will learn in depth about different religious and spiritual ways of life and compare both religions of Christianity and Hinduism. As artists, the children will study the artist Maud Purdy and explore her botanical artwork and style. The children will be inspired by key artwork and make their own creative work in response. As designers, the children will learn about pneumatics and design and make their own a pneumatic toy they will also explore seasonal foods by tasting and a range of food and even make their own tart and fruit kebab.

#### Year 4

In the spring term, as mathematicians the children in Year 4 will consolidate their understanding of multiplication and division, applying their knowledge to explore measurement in particular, length and perimeter. As writers the children will explore key vehicle texts, 'Leaf' and 'Arthur and the Golden Rope', analysing the texts and using these as a stimulus to apply a range of newly taught skills within their independent writing. As scientists, the children will explore the units of electricity and sound. The children will learn the components that make up a simple circuit and create their own and explore how sounds travel. The children will work scientifically to plan and conduct a series of exciting investigations. As Geographers, the children will learn about different climate and biomes around the world, developing an understanding of the relationships between different climate zones and biomes. As designers, the children will follow the design process to plan and make their own working torch. As computer programmers, the children will apply and develop their skills of code using the program Scratch Jr. As theologists, the children will explore, 'Why is Jesus inspiring to some people? '. Taking part in key discussions around the topic. As artists, the children will explore paint and mixed media, looking at the concepts of light and dark. Experimenting with media to create varying tints and shades to provide three dimensions to still life drawings.

### Year 5

In the spring term, as historians the pupils will investigate the Viking, Anglo- Saxon struggle for England and explore whether or not describing the Vikings as just ruthless raiders is a fair description. As geographers, they will enhance their locational and place knowledge by exploring the human and physical geography of North and South America. Pupils will investigate if there is any correlation between the size of the country and its human and physical geography. As scientists, they will explore 'Earth & Space'. Pupils will look at different phases of the Moon and will consider if the Moon is only seen at night and if the Moon creates its own light. Pupils will apply and develop their skills as computer programmers to identify how and why data is collected from space and learn how to read and calculate numbers using binary code. As designers, pupils will create their own doodlers using electrical components and as artists they will explore the life and works of Teis Albers and Karen Rose and develop their printmaking skills. As sportspeople, pupils will explore different passing styles to outwit defenders and apply this to the sport of tag rugby. As theologists, pupils will express their own understanding of what Jesus would do in relation to a moral dilemma from the world today.

### Year 6

In the spring term, Year 6 shall start their topic: Temple of Doom. As historians the children will learn about what it was like to live in Central America during the Ancient Maya Civilisation. As scientists, they will learn about living things and their habitats, classifying groups according to common characteristics. They will apply their working scientifically skills to investigate whether yeast is a living thing. As artists, the children will learn how to convey a message through imagery using paint and mixed media.

As designers, the children will be creating a steady hand game applying their prior knowledge of electricity to support their design process. As mathematicians, the children shall use algebra to learn that a letter can be used to represent a number and further their knowledge of fractions, decimals and percentages. As writers, the children will explore the vehicle text 'An Origin of Species', to write a discovery narrative based on the expeditions of Charles Darwin.
