

- As well as visiting temples, Hindus worship God in their own homes and most houses have either a room or corner in which there is a family shrine.

 Gandhi is one of the most famous leaders and champions for justice in the world. His principles and firm belief in nonviolence have been followed by many other important civil rights leaders including Martin Luther King, Jr. and Nelson Mandela. His renown is such that he is mostly just referred to by the single name "Gandhi".

Sticky Knowledge

Christianity

- Christianity is the world's largest religion.
- People who follow Christianity are called Christians.
- Christians have one God, who they believe created the world in just six days and continues to watch over it.
- Christians believe that God is everywhere and sees and knows everything.
- Today there are about 2.2 billion Christians in the world - almost a third of the world's population.

Islam

- Islam is the world's second-largest religion.
- Muslims are monotheistic, which means they only believe in one God who they call Allah. the Arabic name for God.
- Muslims believe that Allah sent many prophets to Earth to give his message. A prophet is someone who speaks for God on Earth. For Muslims, a man called Muhammad was the final prophet of Allah. He was responsible for starting the faith of Islam and is referred to as the Messenger of God or the Prophet.
- Friday is the Muslim holy day, the time of the week when Muslims go to the mosque and prav.
- Ramadan is the ninth month of the Islamic calendar; during Ramadan Muslims fast (consume no food or drink) from just before dawn until sunset.
