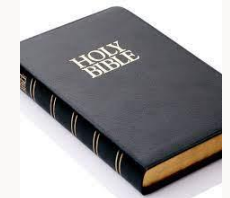

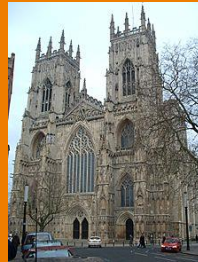

Hinduism

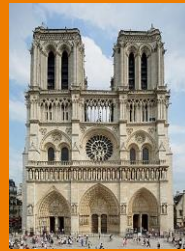
